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FIGURE OF SPEECH

SIMILE- A simile is a figure of speech in which a direct comparison is made between two different objects using the words, 'like' or 'as'. It is used to share the qualities of one object with the other.

EXAMPLE FROM THE POEM

Third stanza of the poem,
What do you make O ye gold

What do you make, O ye goldsmiths?

Wristlet and anklet and ring,

Bells for the feet of blue pigeons,

Frail as a dragon-fly's wing,

Girdles of gold for the dancers,

Scabbards of gold for the king.

This stanza uses a simile in the line "frail as a dragon-fly's wing", to compare the bells to the delicate wings of dragon-fly.

RHYME SCHEME

This poem contains three stanzas of six lines each. It follows the rhyme scheme where the second, fourth and sixth lines in each stanza rhyme with each other. So the rhyme scheme of the poem is ABCBCB.
